May polls 2015: national advertising launch on Monday

On Monday we'll be launching our UK national advertising campaign. Our television advert has now been finalised and [can be viewed here](#) (please note this is embargoed until Monday 16 March, so please don't share until then).

The advert seeks to address under-registration in an engaging way by using the concept of 'loss aversion' from behavioural economics. In certain situations people are more likely to be motivated by realising they may lose something, than the prospect of acquiring a gain.

Filmed with a mix of actors and members of the public captured on hidden cameras, the TV ad shows people's reaction to being stopped doing everyday activities they thought they should be able to do. The message at the end as someone is turned away from a polling station is simple: You can't vote, unless you're registered by 20 April.

May 2015 polls: final reminder of request for information on count arrangements

Thank you to everyone who has completed the survey providing us with information on their count arrangements. There are, however, still some constituencies and local authorities from whom we haven't received any information. We will be publishing the information we have received on count timing and locations on our website by the end of next week. For any constituencies that we haven't received information from, the summary we publish will include the statement 'No information received', and we will direct anyone who wants information on count timing or location for that area to the relevant local authority. While we will update the spreadsheet at several points in the run-up to the May polls if we receive further information after 17 March, please be aware that we will not be making updates on a rolling basis as information is received.

May polls 2015: tallying at postal vote openings

We have been asked for our view on the legality of tallying at postal vote opening sessions, and we can confirm that it is our view that the legislation prohibits it.

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This is because, at a postal vote opening, it is not permissible to 'attempt to ascertain the candidate for whom any vote is given in any particular ballot paper or communicate any information with respect thereto obtained at those proceedings (Section 66(4)(d) of the Representation of the People Act 1983 (as amended)).

This provision therefore prevents those present at the postal vote opening from attempting to ascertain the way individual ballot papers are marked. This interpretation is consistent with Regulation 86 Representation of the People (Scotland) Regulations 2001 which stipulates that, when opening the postal votes, the Returning Officer 'shall keep the ballot papers face downwards and shall take proper precautions for preventing any person from seeing the votes made on the ballot papers'.

It is therefore clear that, at a postal vote opening, ballot papers are to be kept face down and individuals are not permitted to look at the ballot paper to attempt to see how it is marked. In the context of tallying, therefore, it is not the act of counting itself that is prohibited, but the necessary prerequisite of looking at the individual ballot papers to see how they are marked.

We are amending Part 5 of our guidance for candidates and agents at UK Parliamentary to make this point explicitly and expect to publish an updated version later today. We recognise that you may already have printed and distributed packs for prospective candidates, in which case you will need to consider how you can make candidates and their agents aware of this in some other way, such as by covering this in your briefing sessions and making clear at postal vote openings that tallying is not permitted.

IER: advance notice of data collection

We will shortly be sending you a link to a survey which will ask for a small number of key pieces of data related to the 1 April register update. These will be headline figures such as total electorate and the number of additions to the register since 1 December. These should hopefully be straightforward pieces of data to provide. This is clearly a busy time for you, but we would appreciate responses to this as soon as possible following 1 April. The data will help us to form a national picture of the electorate ahead of the May polls.

Changes to Party Election Finance (PEF) online

From 1 April 2015, the Electoral Commission will be launching a new site to replace the old [search pages in PEF Online](#). The new site will introduce a new way to access the register of political parties and each party profile. Using the new site will be faster, more user friendly and will introduce the ability to save or share a direct link to a party's profile page.

While we expect that this new site will make accessing the

information you use much easier, we understand that this is not a good time to be making changes, and so we will continue to maintain the old site until after the elections in May. The old site will be kept up-to-date and you will be able to access it throughout the nominations period to check party names, descriptions and emblems.

We will provide full instructions for how to find information using the new site in a future bulletin.

Contacting the Electoral Commission – new telephone numbers

We have launched a new contact number and a dedicated Wales and Welsh Language Line for our stakeholders to use.

Electoral administrators, candidates and agents and the general public will all be able to call these numbers and from there we will route their enquiries to the most appropriate team to help. The new system will also allow us to better manage our workloads and respond to you more quickly and we would therefore be grateful if you could use these numbers to talk to us about any electoral guidance queries that you have.

The numbers are **0333 103 1928** and **0333 103 1929 (our Wales and Welsh Language Line)**. (If you call 0333 103 1928 from either a mobile phone or a withheld number, you will be asked to choose your location – 1 for England, 2 for Northern Ireland, 3 for Scotland and 4 for Wales.)

- England

You will be presented with a set of options that relate to the types of queries that we regularly receive. If you have a query about running elections or electoral registration then you should press 3. If you find that you are waiting too long for a response, you will either be able to request a call back or leave a voicemail for our English Regional Teams to deal with.

- Scotland

Your call will be transferred directly to our Scotland office where your call will be dealt with by a member of our Scotland team as usual.

- Wales

If you call either 0333 103 1928 or our Wales and Welsh Language Line number (0333 103 1929), you will be transferred to our Wales office where your call will be dealt with by a member of our Wales team as usual.

- Northern Ireland

You will be transferred to our Northern Ireland office where your

call will be dealt with by a member of our Northern Ireland team as usual.

Candidates and agents and the general public

These new numbers have been introduced to streamline the way that all stakeholders contact us. Please give these numbers to candidates and agents and the general public who approach you for our contact details. We have amended all of the contact details on the 'contacts' page of our website, and will change the contact details in our published documents over the next few months. In the meantime, stakeholders who try to call our Party Election Finance advice line or our Public Information line using our old numbers will be transferred automatically to our 0333 103 1928 number.

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
