

Technical Details

 The following report contrasts findings from the Mainstage of the 2012 Winter Tracker with findings for the BME Boost, which was conducted in parallel and funded by the Cabinet Office.

Mainstage

- TNS BMRB interviewed a nationally representative quota sample of 1,200 adults living in the UK and aged 18+. The sample consisted of 998 interviews with people living in Great Britain and a boost of 202 interviews with people living in Northern Ireland.
- The survey was conducted by telephone and took place between 7th and 10th December 2012.
- Data was weighted to match the profile of the UK population using a range of variables including gender, age, working status, social grade and region.

BME Boost

- In addition to the mainstage of interviewing, a 'BME boost' was conducted amongst black and minority ethnic groups aged 18+ living in the UK.
- As part of the Boost survey, TNS BMRB interviewed 999 BME respondents living in Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Quotas were set to ensure a representative sample of each target ethnic groups was achieved.
- An additional 94 BME respondents were interviewed as part of the Mainstage were and added to the BME dataset.
- The survey was conducted by telephone and took place between 7th and 23rd December 2012.
- The BME boost used a similar questionnaire to the Mainstage, with some additional questions asked of BME respondents. The BME respondents from the Mainstage sample were not asked the specific BME Boost questions. Throughout this report, base size descriptions should make clear which groups were asked each question.
- Data was weighted to match the profile of the UK BME population using a range of variables including ethnicity, gender, age, region, working status and religion.

General

- Where results do not sum to 100%, this is because of rounding, multiple response codes or the exclusion of 'Don't know' responses.
- An asterisk (*) represents results of less than half a percent.
- A dash (-) represents results where a response code was unused by respondents.

In general data is excluded where the base size is less than 50. Where data is included with a base size below 50 a note has been added to the text to highlight this.	

Summary of Key Results

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The summary report highlights the key differences between the attitudes amongst the overall UK population and those of the UK's BME population; the main differences between BME groups are also singled out.

Voting and Registration

- Nearly seven in ten BME respondents (69%) said that they were either very or fairly confident that elections are well run in Great Britain and Northern Ireland but within this there were some significant differences. Nearly eight in ten Black African respondents said that they were confident that elections were well run (78%) compared to just over six in ten Black Caribbean respondents (62%).
- Around half (53%) of BME respondents said that they always vote at general elections, with a quarter (25%) saying they sometimes vote. Nearly twice as many respondents from a mixed background say that they never vote compared to the BME population overall (25% cf. 13%), although this could in part be due to the fact that they have a younger age profile.
- Over two thirds of BME respondents (68%) were satisfied with the actual process of voting at elections. Respondents with a mixed background were the least likely to say that they were satisfied with the process (54%) but this was due to more people within this group saying that they were neutral and the proportion who were actively dissatisfied was in line with the other groups.
- Although they reported a high level of confidence and satisfaction in the electoral system, BME respondents were less confident that they know how to go about casting their vote. Just under half (48%) said they were very confident they knew how they would go about doing this. Black African and Caribbean respondents were found to be the most confident that they know how to go about casting their vote (61% said to be very confident cf. 48% within all BME respondents).
- A similar proportion of BME respondents (51%) said they were very confident that they know how to go about registering to vote and again this confidence was higher among African and Caribbean respondents (65% & 63% compared to 51% of all BME respondents).
- More than nine in ten BME respondents (91%) reported that they were registered to vote either at their current address (87%) or somewhere else (4%). The mixed groups were the least likely to say that they were registered to vote (85%) but again this may be a result of their slightly younger age profile.

• Nearly four in ten BME respondents (39%) said that they were registered for a postal vote with the highest rates being reported for Pakistani (46%) and African respondents (46%).

Individual Electoral Registration

- In June 2011 the government announced plans to introduce Individual Electoral Registration (IER). Under IER individuals would be asked to provide 'identifying information', such as a Date of Birth and National Insurance number, when they apply to register.
- When asked about the impact a requirement to provide additional 'identifying information' would have, Bangladeshi respondents were significantly more likely to say that having to give their National Insurance Number would make them less likely to vote (29% cf. 16% of the overall BME population). There were no significant differences when asked about providing date of birth or signatures.
- Nine out of ten BME respondents (90%) said it would be easy for them to find their National Insurance number if they needed it for official purposes. Bangladeshi respondents were slightly less likely to say it would be easy to provide their National Insurance Number (86%) than the BME population as a whole, but this was not statistically significant and so does not explain the much higher proportion of Bangladeshis saying that having to provide it would make them less likely to register.

Integrity of Elections

- Just under a third of BME respondents (32%) said that they understood "Nothing at all" about electoral fraud in the UK and only around one in twenty said they understood a lot (7%). Looking between groups, Pakistani respondents were the most likely to say that they knew a lot about electoral fraud but this was still only around one in seven (14%).
- Around a third of BME respondents (34%) said that electoral fraud was a fairly or very big problem in Great Britain/Northern Ireland. This was particularly a concern for Bangladeshi respondents with half (50%) saying that it was a very or fairly big problem.
- While the majority of BME respondents felt that voting at a polling station was safe from fraud or abuse (85%), only around three fifths felt the same about voting by post (57%). There were no significant differences between different groups around perceptions of the safety from fraud of voting either in person or by post.
