Thank you for your email to the Electoral Commission dated **05 December 2017**.

The Commission aims to respond to requests for information promptly and regrets that on this occasion we have not done so.

Your request is in bold below followed by our response.

Under Freedom of Information legislation please provide me with a copy of all documents held by the Electoral Commission during the months of September, October and November 2017 including letters, internal correspondence, reports, research, reviews, briefing documents, minutes of meetings, emails and memos that make reference to plans to implement legislation in Westminster lifting the ban on naming donors to political parties in Northern Ireland.

If this time period is too long to comply with cost and time exemptions, please provide me with the same information for the longest time period possible. For example, if three months is too long please provide me with the documents for October and November 2017. If this still breaches time and cost exemptions please provide me with the documents for the period of November 2017. If this is still too long please provide me with the longest time period possible starting backwards from Friday 24th November.

Our response is as follows:

We hold some of the information you have requested.

The Commission also holds information which is relevant to your request but which we consider to be exempt from disclosure under the FOI Act. This information falls into the following categories:

- Information which involves or relates to discussions between staff of the Electoral Commission and UK Government officials about the issue of donations to political parties in Northern Ireland. Disclosing this information would inhibit the free and frank provision of advice between the Electoral Commission and the UK's various governments in future, and which is therefore exempt from disclosure under s36(2)(b)(i) of the FOI Act.
- Information which involves or relates to communications between lawyers and other staff at the Electoral Commission which is subject to legal professional privilege, and which is therefore exempt from disclosure under s42 of the FOI Act.

 Information relating to donations to which the current statutory prohibition on publication applies (under s71E of the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000), and which is therefore exempt from disclosure under s44(1)(a) of the FOI Act.

I trust that this information satisfies your request. The Commission strives to be an open, transparent authority, but in some circumstances we cannot responsibly release requested information, and we ask for your understanding in this regard.

Do you know why the legislation has been delayed? Is it because of X?

That's a question for the Government to answer. We don't know the reason for the delay. We won't speculate on it.

When will the data be published? Will the public ever get to see this data?

We have received the data and are ready to publish it as soon as the legislation is passed. So it will be published as soon as the legislation goes through Parliament. We urge the Government to bring forward the legislation as soon as possible.

You'll recall a little while back we discussed whether the way parties over report aggregated donations has any impact on the register of donations and what we publish.

This point came about after we produced guidance for the NI transparency Order and discovered that historically parties over report donations in a way that isn't in accordance with PPERA (I forwarded that legal advice earlier in the week).

At the time we felt relatively relaxed about this issue as long as it didn't have any unintended consequences for the register of donations.

I asked for legal advice and that's below.

In short I think we're okay to continue publishing donations the way we are but there are risks associated with that approach namely:

- donors donating amounts under the relevant reportability thresholds to privacy;
- and the expectation donors have as to the circumstances under which their details will be made public;
- consistency with the Commission's enforcement policy in relation to over reporting in spending returns (e.g. as in the Conservative Party case), which may need to be the subject of further legal advice.

My view is that we can continue our current approach so long as we're comfortable with the associated risks, but we should think about handling and how we communicate this to the parties (i.e you can report one way under PPERA but we understand that's burdensome so we're happy for you to continue to report the way you are). I'm on holiday from tomorrow, so will leave this with you to consider.

Hi Louise,

I need some relatively urgent legal advice please. If I could have a response by COP 13 October that would be handy.

The issue is quite difficult to explain in an email so a chat might be easier. I've summarised briefly the issue below.

1. Political parties report aggregated donations. These being donations that aggregate over £7,500 from the same source in a calendar year. At that point the threshold reduces to £1,500 if the same source continues to donate. This is best explained in the example:

The Party is given a regular contribution of £1,000 per month for the whole of 2017.

The £7,500 reporting threshold is exceeded in August. The Party must report all donations accepted up to August in their Q3 return. The Commission publishes all eight £1,000 donations – including the donations from before 1 July 2017. This is because those donations aggregate to over £7,500 with the other donations accepted in Q3.

Because a donation from the donor has been reported in Q3, the reporting threshold for further donations from the same donor falls to £1,500. This is exceeded in October and again in December. The Party reports the next two donations of £1,000 as accruing in October and a further two donations of £1,000 which become recordable in December, both in their Q4 return. The Commission publishes that quarter as usual.

- 2. It has become apparent that the Commission has advised parties to report donations from the same source differently. That is that once the £7,500 threshold is exceeded parties then report each £500 donation from that same source rather than when the donations exceed £1,500.
- 3. The issue I'd like clarification on is whether this over reporting has any implications for the register of donations? In other words does PPERA allow us to publish these individual donations of £500 before it reaches £1,500. Or is there a specific requirement which stipulates the Commission can only publish donations that have reached the relevant reporting threshold (i.e £1,500)?

Apologies if this isn't very clear – as I said a conversation may be needed.

Subject: Media articles on transparency in Northern Ireland

Dear all – you may have seen the media coverage today of my recent interview with The Detail website, which was picked up by the <u>Belfast Telegraph</u> and others. The Detail's report is <u>here</u>.

The interview was recorded at the start of September for one of The Detail's investigations into election finance reporting in Northern Ireland, but was only published on their website yesterday. It was then picked up by other media.

Three points come out in the media coverage of the interview:

- Consideration of lowering the threshold for reporting donations, since £7,500 is very high given the size of the parties in Northern Ireland. This was the last question in The Detail's interview, but became the main point of the article. It is however an appropriate point for the Commission to raise now that transparency is about to be achieved. We should consider repeating this point when we publish the first set of donations data for Northern Ireland (due to be before the end of 2017). Obviously we would need to consider the wider implications since £7,500 is a UK-wide threshold at present;
- Repeating the Commission's earlier recommendation that we should have powers to investigate compliance issues in candidate spending returns. We first made this recommendation in 2013, and repeated it in the 2015 UKPGE Campaign spending report (see recommendation 1).
- Calls for transparency in Northern Ireland to be back-dated to January 2014, a point we continue to make (and which we should repeat when we publish the first set of data).

My thoughts on the privacy angle are the same. In terms of over-reporting, the issues in the CUP case (summarised here only) related to over-reporting obscuring transparency and calling into question the completeness and accuracy of the return. Here, it seems to me that any 'over-reporting' of donations doesn't have the same effect but aids transparency.

I don't like the idea of guidance focussing on NI saying anything different from guidance on widely on how the aggregation rules work though. Bob is your thought that the NI guidance or the wider guidance needs amending, or an element of both to ensure they are consistent? My only other thought is whether we say anything to parties about this or not. All appear to have operated in the administratively simpler way for a number of years. We are due to publish the GB Q3 donation and loans data on 23 November, which is when we were expecting to publish the first set of NI data. Unless others disagree, on 23 Nov I think we should put out a strongly worded statement expressing our disappointment that the necessary legislation has not be laid. Given that the NIO has had to consult the Commission on the draft legislation, we might even say that we know that the legislation has been drafted and from our perspective is ready to be laid in Parliament.

All other content within this update is not relevant to that requested.

Update from Northern Ireland

- 0.1 The Transparency Order 2018 was laid before Parliament by the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland on 23 November 2017. This is an important milestone towards transparency of NI donations and loans, which the Commission has been calling for since 2005.
- 0.2 On the Order being laid, we wrote to all NI party treasurers and NI MPs/MLAs explaining the prospective changes to the rules and where they can find more information (this is part of a series of letters sent to parties/MPs to help them understand the rules), and published a factsheet with working examples. Further Commission guidance will be published as soon as the law come into force.
- 0.3 When the Order is in force, the Commission will be able to publish information about NI donations and loans dating back to 1 July 2017. It is an affirmative Order and has to be debated by both Houses of the UK Parliament before it can be 'made' by the Secretary of State and come into force. (The debates can approve or reject the Order, but cannot amend it.) We hope to be able to publish in the early new year, but the timing of our first publication will depend on the parliamentary passage of the Order.
- 0.4 On the morning of 23 November, the Commission published <u>a statement</u> expressing disappointment that legislation had not been passed to allow publication of Quarter 3 NI donations alongside the GB donation reports which were published that day, contrary to earlier indications from NIO. A link to our statement urging the Government to lay the Order is <u>here</u>. The statement was covered in NI media and Ann Watt gave some interviews in the morning and additional interviews after the legislation was laid in the afternoon.
- 0.5 As widely reported in the media, talks between the Northern Ireland parties have not reached agreement. In the absence of an Executive being formed, on 13 November the Secretary of State introduced a bill in Parliament to impose a budget for Northern Ireland government departments. Another NI Assembly election remains a possibility, but has not been mentioned publicly by the Secretary of State as an option in recent months.
- 0.6 The Chief Electoral Officer plans to launch online registration in Northern Ireland in early February 2018. We are also beginning work with the Chief Electoral Officer to introduce performance standards in Northern Ireland, and about making further improvements to the planning for Single Transferable Vote counts.

1. Why are NI parties not included in today's data?

Today we've expressed our disappointment that we remain unable to publish the details of political donations and loans in Northern Ireland, because the UK Government has not yet made the necessary legislation.

In July the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced that he would bring forward legislation to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of data on donations to Northern Ireland political parties today, alongside the information on donations to political parties in Great Britain. However, it is unable to do so as the necessary legislation has not been made. Because of this the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing any information relating to donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland.

We urge the UK Government without delay to bring forward this legislation for parliament to approve to allow us to publish this information as soon as possible.

Electoral Commission statement on publication of legislation that will enable transparency in Northern Ireland

Today the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland laid legislation to enable the publication of information about donations and loans to political parties. Ann Watt, Head of the Electoral Commission in Northern Ireland said:

"Transparency about political donations is essential to confidence in the democratic process. We welcome the publication of this legislation which, once passed, will mean that information about political donations and loans in Northern Ireland will be published for the first time. We look forward to the first publication of this data which we expect to be before the end of this year.

"While we welcome this progress, we would urge the Government to bring forward additional legislation to enable the publication of donation and loan information from January 2014, as anticipated by the primary legislation passed at that time. We believe that it is in the public interest for this information also to be made available."

NI transparency Order - Implementation plan and actions – explanatory narrative

The Order was laid on 23 November 2017

Action #1 – September 2017 (COMPLETED)

More detailed guidance relating to Northern Ireland reporting would be published, and a letter with specific actions that we want parties to take and/or prepare for before/during the October reporting period would be sent out to the relevant parties.

Jenny queried whether we can use our PPERA Schedule 19B investigatory powers for an SI that has not yet been made. was to consider whether we are able to use this power. subsequently asked for this query to also include a scenario where an SI has been made but has not yet come into force. Considering this situation would help us to decide what to say when sending further guidance to the parties. Two potential options were to:

- 1. Write to the parties referencing the factsheet that we provided and explain that received dates are now very important and should be included in parties' third-quarter reports, with the possibility that we may ask them to re-confirm their stated dates at a later time;
- 2. Write to the parties explaining that once we are sure of our legal powers or the Order has been made we will use our disclosure power to re-confirm the accuracy of parties' stated dates.

Explanation

sent through formal advice on 27/09/17 confirming that we cannot issue a disclosure notice until the Order is made. Louise Edwards decided that we would instead write to the parties to request the relevant dates, and would advise them that we will not publish this information until we are satisfied that all the information we have is correct.

The letters sent to the Northern Ireland parties informing them of the rules included a paragraph about needing the received dates.

Action #2 - September 2017 (COMPLETED 27/09/17)

Confirmation was required as to whether PEF Online would need to be updated in order to make the received date of a donation a mandatory field to be completed by parties and regulated donees. Jo Crofton-Diggins to confirm if changes would be required and how this would be implemented.

Explanation

sent an email outlining options regarding this. proposed that it would be sensible to check at the outset whether or not PPERA required us to display the registers for Northern Ireland separately from those of Great Britain, and in any specific way. This query and the issue of possible PEF Online changes were given to for assessment.

Umar confirmed on 27/09/17 that the received date is already a mandatory field on PEF Online for current parties and regulated donees, and will therefore also be mandatory for Northern Ireland parties and regulated donees. No further action required.

Action #3 - September 2017 (COMPLETED 27/09/17)

Compliance will need to make a decision about the occasions when we want to use our disclosure notice power and how this will be framed, so that Guidance can work out how to incorporate an explanation of this into letters, guidance, factsheets etc., and a formal disclosure notice template can be prepared to be used as appropriate.

Explanation

Following legal advice received on 27/09/17 it was decided that Compliance will not use disclosure notices before the Order is made. Instead they will write to the parties requesting the relevant information and will confirm to them that we will not publish any information until we are satisfied that such information is correct.

Action #4 - September 2017 (COMPLETED 05/10/17)

The letter we will send to parties will be updated to include a paragraph requesting the received dates of donations from parties, in the absence of using a disclosure notice. We will confirm in the letter that reported donations will not be published until we have this information.

Explanation

Louise updated the letter accordingly on 05/10/17 with relevant wording regarding the use of disclosure notices.

Action #5 - September 2017 (COMPLETED 03/10/17)

The letter we will send to parties will be updated to include a link to PEF Online, so that parties can report via PEF if they wish to.

Explanation

updated the letter accordingly on 03/10/17.

Following discussions at the meeting on 16/11/17 we agreed that Northern Ireland parties should not be encouraged to submit returns through PEF Online until such time as we are sure that it is fit for this purpose. The agreed to change the letters to the parties and regulated donees to state that PEF Online should not be used until we have implemented updates following changes in the

Action #6 - September 2017 (COMPLETED 23/11/17)

Communications staff to liaise with Communications at the Northern Ireland Office to begin discussing media statements and timings, as it was presumed that the Commission would want to make a statement when the Order was laid.

Explanation

The Commission's statement was drafted and reviewed in discussion with NIO when we knew that the Order was about to be laid. The Order was laid on 23/11/17 and the Commission published its media statement.

Action #7 - September 2017 (COMPLETED)

All enquiries relevant to Northern Ireland transparency would be logged and provided to Guidance to aid in planning factsheets/guidance/letters.

Explanation

Ann Watt determined that the factsheet we drew up covers all predictable questions so logging enquiries will not be necessary at this stage.

Action #8 - September 2017 (COMPLETED)

It was considered whether it would be worth contacting councillors and independents in Northern Ireland about the rule changes to transparency.

Explanation

Ann confirmed that it is sufficient to contact MPs, MLAs and parties, and it is not necessary to contact councillors and independents.

Action #9 - September/October 2017 (COMPLETED 12/10/17)

The Commission will need a clear decision-maker for publication, and an alternate decision-maker. For example, the decision-maker could be the Head of Regulation in consultation with the Head of the Northern Ireland Office, and the alternate could be the PFR Director. This should be documented in the Executive Scheme of Delegation. It is necessary to check that Bob Posner, legal and others agree, and that the relevant decision-maker be formally informed via email. The scheme of delegation will also need to be updated — is the relevant person to complete this.

Explanation

The scheme of delegation was updated on 12/10/17 to confirm the decision-makers for publishing information on donations and loans.

Action #10 - September/October 2017 (OUTSTANDING)

Compliance will need a simple flowchart to assist in checking returns. This might cover various scenarios (aggregation of donations, changes to loans etc.) to help the team adapt to a new system where some things are required or permitted (sometimes depending on our judgment) to be published and other things are still required to remain confidential.

Action #11 - October 2017 (COMPLETED 23/11/17)

We will send parties and regulated donees a letter confirming when the Order is laid and what they will need to do in October, and what we plan on doing in November or December regarding publication.

Explanation

Guidance sent a letter on 23/11/17 to all Northern Ireland party treasurers and Northern Ireland MPs and MLAs confirming that the Order had been laid and providing details of the new rules. The letter also linked to the factsheet that we had produced.

Action #12 - October 2017 (COMPLETED 19/10/17)

There is a potential for disconnect between how aggregated donations operate under PPERA, and what the parties report and the Commission chooses to accept/publish. This may result in having to inform parties to change their approach to reporting aggregated donations, in accordance with the law. Our understanding was that aggregated donations for Northern Ireland parties must be checked, but that we are prohibited from publishing aggregated donations from the same source below £1,500 after £7,500 has been exceeded.

Explanation

confirmed on 13/10/17 that the aggregation of donations works as we thought under PPERA and therefore the table in our factsheet is correct. provided subsequent advice on 18/10/17 on any implications for the register of donations, which does not raise any significant issues with the way parties currently over-report donations – but there are associated risks involved. emailed Bob, Ann and Louise about this and requested their input.

It was agreed on 19/10/17 that there was no need to inform the parties, but that guidance should be checked to ensure that it does not conflict with the aggregation approach.

Action #13 – October 2017 (COMPLETED)

We want to be in a position to publish amended guidance and forms as soon as possible after the Order is made. We will also need to update our parties and regulated donees webpages.

Im looking at the legislation and wondering if the approach in the updated factsheet arises from the way the legislation refers to <u>a</u> donation /<u>a</u> benefit causing the aggregated amount to be more than £7,500 has to recorded in the report for the reporting period in which it was accepted

So in the scenario where the individual gives 1K a month, **the** donation that causes the 7.5K threshold to be exceeded is the August one because it is **the eight** donation "when if it is added to any other relevant benefits the aggregate of the benefits is more than £7.5K" – this aggregate (8K in this example) must "be recorded together with any other relevant donations included in the aggregate amount in the donation report for the reporting period in which **the** benefit causes that aggregate amount to be more than 7.5K accrues"

Whilst the 9th donation in September is accepted in Q3 (and one would therefore assume it would be included in the Q3 report – and is what happens in practice I believe) technically it is only **the** donation which causes the 7.5K aggregate to be exceeded which must be recorded in the Q3 report. The reporting threshold for future donations from that source is then reset to 1.5K and the party has to report the next donation/s that cause the 1.5K to be exceeded

So the September donation is only 1K and therefore doesn't have to be reported in Q3 (even though its accepted in Q3) because the new threshold of 1.5 K is yet to be exceeded which causes a donation to be required to be reported in a return.

When the party receives donation number 10 in October it gets added to the September donation this accrues to 2k and these two donations now become reportable in the Q4 return because the donation that caused the 1.5K threshold to be exceeded was accepted in Q4 (and the September donation hasn't been included in a previous report so it now gets reported). The threshold gets reset to 1.5K again

Similarly the November and December 1K donations when added together exceed the 1.5K threshold and both of these fall to be included in the Q4 return along with the September and October donations

If the donations in November and December had dropped to £500 I don't think these would have to be included in the Q4 report because the 1.5K threshold would not have been exceeded again in the calendar year. (however in practice parties would include all aggregates in a given quarter)

Does that sound sensible if somewhat cumbersome.....

I've had a go at drafting a letter to the party that has not provided the received and accepted dates in its Q2 and 3 donation reports. As you know this exercise has raised a few questions. I've left a few questions and comments on the letter and I think will need to make a call on the tone /approach we are going to use. Also I'm still confused about when we can use the disclosure notice powers if we need to use this to get information (can we only use them once the order is laid or made or can we use the power regardless of the order?). I referred to use of this power in the letter but we may not want to refer to this at this stage – I'm mindful that parties may be slow to respond to requests for additional information and hence I hoped this would encourage them to respond by the date in the letter without recourse to formal action.

I also think that it might be helpful to document the individual steps that we will take to confirm the information in reports before publication so that we are covering ourselves in terms of being able to demonstrate that we have 'reasonable belief'. I know that you have a flow chart to help us decide whether or not we can form reasonable belief and I don't want to create documents for the sake of it but I want us to be confident that if we are challenged at any stage that we can demonstrate we took all steps we should have and that's documented -maybe we just need to log all the correspondence relating to a particular party's report? You mentioned that some of this may be covered in the master publication spreadsheet so maybe we could document it there?

Let me know what you think and thanks for your help over the last couple of days on this.

I'm not in the office tomorrow but will be back in on Thursday.

There are rules on who can make donations and loans to political parties and other campaigners. For instance, individuals can only donate if they are on an electoral register.

Parties have to record the donations and loans they receive, check they are from a permissible source, and report larger donations and loans to us. In Great Britain, we <u>publish these donation and loan reports on our online database</u> to ensure there is transparency about the funding of parties.

There are currently different rules on the reporting of donations and loans to parties in Northern Ireland. They must report donations and loans to us in the same way as parties in Great Britain. However, we are currently barred from publishing this information.

The <u>Government has consulted on draft legislation</u> which provides for more transparency on party funding in Northern Ireland. Once passed, this legislation will allow us to publish more information about the donations and loans that parties in Northern Ireland report to us.

- It continues to be the case that we are disappointed to not publish NI donations tomorrow

 information for GB parties. To my knowledge nobody is expecting us to announce it has
 been delayed.

You'll recall a little while back we discussed whether the way parties over report aggregated donations has any impact on the register of donations and what we publish.

This point came about after we produced guidance for the NI transparency Order and discovered that historically parties over report donations in a way that isn't in accordance with PPERA (I forwarded that legal advice earlier in the week).

At the time we felt relatively relaxed about this issue as long as it didn't have any unintended consequences for the register of donations.

I asked for legal advice and that's below.

In short I think we're okay to continue publishing donations the way we are but there are risks associated with that approach namely:

- donors donating amounts under the relevant reportability thresholds to privacy;
- and the expectation donors have as to the circumstances under which their details will be made public;
- consistency with the Commission's enforcement policy in relation to over reporting in spending returns (e.g. as in the Conservative Party case), which may need to be the subject of further legal advice.

My view is that we can continue our current approach so long as we're comfortable with the associated risks, but we should think about handling and how we communicate this to the parties (i.e you can report one way under PPERA but we understand that's burdensome so we're happy for you to continue to report the way you are). I'm on holiday from tomorrow, so will leave this with you to consider.

Following our discussion the other day, I spoke with who recalled dealing with the aggregation point in 2014/5, but not with the question of over reporting of donations or publication of such donations in the register.

Please note that I use the term "donation" to include aggregate donations in this advice.

Where parties report donations of £1500 or less to the Commission (i.e. not recordable donations) in their s62 reports, is there an issue with the Commission publishing such donations in the register of recordable donations?

Over Reporting of Donations

S62 PPERA requires political parties to prepare and submit quarterly donation reports, containing details of "recordable donations" – those donations which exceed £7,500, or, where a previous donation from the same source has exceeded £7,500, those donations which exceed £1,500. For the purposes of Part IV PPERA, any donation of £500 or less is disregarded.

For convenience, since about 2001 the Commission has allowed parties to "over report" and to include, in the case of multiple donations from the same source, all subsequent donations whether or not they exceed the recordability threshold of £1,500. This is on the basis that it is administratively more convenient for the parties, and within the spirit of the Act.

I have not been asked to advise specifically on this point, but I note that the recommendation of the <u>Neill Report</u> was that there should be clear rules on full public disclosure of donations to political parties of £5,000 or more in any one financial year from any one person or source. This was carried out in PPERA (the limit having been raised to £7,500 by the Political Parties and Elections Act 2009). The intention behind the donations reporting provisions is to ensure transparency and to improve public confidence in political party finances and the integrity of the political process.

However, the report noted that the arguments in favour of secrecy merited serious consideration: the right to privacy and anonymity in making donations; the right to privacy in respect of political affiliation; the consequences of disclosure; the risk of discrimination or intimidation. There were concerns that the publishing of donors' identities would lead to a reduction in political donations.

The Committee identified that it was in the public interest "for the public to know when a donation is made to a political party which is significant enough to prompt questions or to raise suspicion about its purpose" (para 4.28), but not necessarily for the public to know the details of every donation made to a political party. Reporting of such minor donations would be unnecessarily intrusive and administratively burdensome. The limits of £500, £1,500 and £7,500 (as they currently stand) were therefore set to reduce this burden.

Given that some parties have indicated that it would be less administratively burdensome to simply report all subsequent donations from the same source, it may be appropriate to allow this. Reporting of such donations would not decrease transparency and gives the Commission a clearer picture of donations. However, there are potentially two issues with this: the first is the issue of the Commission's publication of the recordable donations register under s69 (addressed below); the second is consistency with the Commission's enforcement policy in relation to over reporting in spending returns (e.g. as in the Conservative Party case), which may need to be the subject of further legal advice.

The Register

Under s69 the Commission is required to maintain a register containing details of all donations reported to them under Part IV PPERA. Any recordable donation reported by a political party under s62 must therefore be included within the register. However, any donation reported by a political party in a s62 return which is not required to be reported by virtue of that section as it is too small to reach the relevant threshold is not a donation reported under Part IV PPERA and is not required to be included in the register of recordable donations.

I understand that, whilst it is administratively convenient for parties to "over report" donations, it is less administratively convenient for the Commission to isolate those donations which do not meet the s62 definition of a "recordable donation" and to manage which donations are included on the register and which are not. There is nothing in s69 to state that the Commission may not include such donations in the register. Although s69 does not provide for the Commission to do so, it is arguable that the Commission may use its power under paragraph 2 schedule 1 to do so, if this would be a course of action calculated to facilitate, incidental or conducive to, the carrying out of its functions. However, there are a number of issues which must be considered, including the following:

- It is clear from the Explanatory Notes and the Neill Report that the purpose of the two-level reporting system (i.e. that donations of £500 and under do not count as donations at all for the purpose of this part of PPERA, and that donations over £5,000 (or £1,500 for additional donations) are publicly reportable) is to strike a balance between transparency and the rights and expectations of donors in relation to privacy (as set out above). Parties are required to keep records of smaller donations, whilst larger donations are made public.
- I note that s69 PPERA is titled "Register of recordable donations". The Explanatory Notes state at paragraph 132 that this is intended to be a register of all donations reported to the Commission; however, it was not envisaged at the time of drafting that parties would actively choose to over report. It appears therefore that only recordable donations are intended to be included on the register.
- The factors set out in the Neill Report and referenced above relating to privacy are still
 relevant. I would also note that any potential donor visiting our webpage would not expect a
 donation falling under the relevant thresholds to be made public: see e.g.
 https://www.electoralcommission.org.uk/find-information-by-subject/political-parties-

<u>campaigning-and-donations/donations-and-loans-to-political-parties/quarterly-donations-and-loans.</u>

 To protect the privacy and safety of individual donors, home addresses are not included on the register. This may be sufficient to grant privacy to some donors, but not to well known individuals.

The Commission must weigh the convenience and increased transparency involved in publishing all donations reported by parties under s62, whether or not they are "recordable" as defined in that section, against the right of donors donating amounts under the relevant reportability thresholds to privacy, and the expectation donors have as to the circumstances under which their details will be made public.

I need some relatively urgent legal advice please. If I could have a response by COP 13 October that would be handy.

The issue is quite difficult to explain in an email so a chat might be easier. I've summarised briefly the issue below.

1. Political parties report aggregated donations. These being donations that aggregate over £7,500 from the same source in a calendar year. At that point the threshold reduces to £1,500 if the same source continues to donate. This is best explained in the example:

The Party is given a regular contribution of £1,000 per month for the whole of 2017.

The £7,500 reporting threshold is exceeded in August. The Party must report all donations accepted up to August in their Q3 return. The Commission publishes all eight £1,000 donations – including the donations from before 1 July 2017. This is because those donations aggregate to over £7,500 with the other donations accepted in Q3.

Because a donation from the donor has been reported in Q3, the reporting threshold for further donations from the same donor falls to £1,500. This is exceeded in October and again in December. The Party reports the next two donations of £1,000 as accruing in October and a further two donations of £1,000 which become recordable in December, both in their Q4 return. The Commission publishes that quarter as usual.

- 2. It has become apparent that the Commission has advised parties to report donations from the same source differently. That is that once the £7,500 threshold is exceeded parties then report each £500 donation from that same source rather than when the donations exceed £1,500.
- 3. The issue I'd like clarification on is whether this over reporting has any implications for the register of donations? In other words does PPERA allow us to publish these individual donations of £500 before it reaches £1,500. Or is there a specific requirement which stipulates the Commission can only publish donations that have reached the relevant reporting threshold (i.e £1,500)?

Apologies if this isn't very clear – as I said a conversation may be needed.

The Electoral Commission has today expressed its disappointment that it remains unable to publish the details of political donations and loans in Northern Ireland, because the UK Government has not yet made the necessary legislation.

In July the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced that he would bring forward legislation to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of data on donations to Northern Ireland political parties today, alongside the information on donations to political parties in Great Britain. However, it is unable to do so as the necessary legislation has not been made. Because of this the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing any information relating to donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland.

In response to this, Ann Watt, Head of the Electoral Commission in Northern Ireland said:

"We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to provide the public with the information they expected on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded. The continuing secrecy only serves to undermine trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

We were consulted by the Northern Ireland Office several months ago on draft legislation and provided detailed comments. In our view the legislation is ready to be laid in Parliament now.

The Commission urges the UK Government to immediately bring forward this legislation to allow us to publish this information as soon as possible."

I'm trying to get up to speed on the NI D and L project and have a few questions that I was hoping you could help with. (Coming to you first in your capacity as project manager rather than go round the houses)

Forms

I see in previous notes that started working on amending forms etc. but he advises me that was passed on to someone else, perhaps ? — can you tell me who was given that work and what if anything was done on the forms or explanatory notes? Specifically were any amendments made in respect of emphasising the importance of the received date?

Reasonable belief

I'm unclear about what has been decided in terms of how the Commission will be demonstrating / recording that it has reasonable believe regarding the received date on Q3 forms and the received date in subsequent quarters (albeit that the risk of inaccurate /incorrect received dates should recede after Q3 2017). I read legal advice on this which suggests to me that we need to actively be confirming the received dates and recording this somewhere, as a defence, in the event that we publish something that we should not have.

There is a 'Reasonable belief' flow chart that and and have prepared but this seems to pose the question is there any reason why we don't believe the received date put on the form or will we issue a disclosure notice to 'get the received date'. My reading of the legal advice is that it would be best practice for us to build in 'active' steps to confirm the received date for Q3 onwards into the QMS procedures. There also appeared to be some suggestion that we would check the received date / issue a disclosure notice in each case (but this may have changed in later discussions)?

QMS- and process for handling NI D and L going forward

On a general note I wonder what has been agreed regarding amending/ reviewing QMS procedures. PEF 77 (NI donations and loans handling) was mentioned at the last meeting, but there are a number of related procedures and I wonder what has been agreed about reviewing these?

Has anything been agreed in relation to how future NI d and L reports will be processed as historically this was done in both London and Belfast depending on where the report was received but this was prior to PEF online being used for publication. For example as the duty to check permissibility of donors to NI recipients will continue (rather than the general monitoring compliance with PPERA duty in respect of GB recipients) we need to agree who does this and when (before /post publication) etc. Will future NI reports default to the 'GB' procedure – will we still run parallel systems – e.g. in case of a pre-July 2017 donation being reported late?

I hope this makes sense, please give me a call if it's not clear. Apologies in advance if I'm asking things that have already been agreed, as I said above I'm trying to get my head around what may previously have been discussed/agreed.



Latest figures for GB political party donations and loans borrowing published

Seven political parties registered in Great Britain reported accepting a total of more than £6 million in donations between 1 July and 30 September 2017 – the first quarterly reporting period after the UK Parliamentary general election - according to new figures published today.

This quarter saw around the same amount in reported donations when compared to the same quarter in 2016 (£6.5million). There was a steep decline compared to the previous quarter of 2017, which covered the UK Parliamentary general election and saw more than £40 million in donations reported.

The seven political parties to report donations accepted were:

| Conservative and Unionist Party | £3,701,470 |
| Co-operative Party | £30,000 |
| Green Party | £26,550 |

| Total | £6,187,723 |

In addition to these donations, during the third quarter of 2017 five parties accepted a total of more than £3.3 million from public funds – money and assistance allocated to parliamentary opposition parties to assist with costs.

The value of outstanding loans to political parties as of 30 September 2017 stood at £4,151,868, which is a decrease of £59,240 compared to the end of the second quarter of 2017.

Ten parties failed to meet the deadline for reporting for this quarter. The Commission will consider each of these matters in line with its enforcement policy, which is available to view here.

Northern Ireland

In July this year the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced legislation would be brought forward to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of this data as part of today's publication; however, the legislation has not been made and the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing this information.

Bob Posner, Director of Political Finance and Regulation & Legal Counsel at the Electoral Commission said:

"This data is hugely important in ensuring that our political finance system is as transparent as possible across the whole of the UK. We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to provide the public with the information they expected on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded. The continuing secrecy only serves to undermine trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

"The Commission urges the UK Government without delay to bring forward the legislation that it has already announced, for parliament to approve. This would allow us to publish donations and loans to Northern Ireland parties as soon as possible."


- 2. The Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 (PPERA) requires registered parties to report cash and non-cash donations and borrowing to the Electoral Commission on a quarterly basis. Political parties must report all donations and borrowing over £7,500 relating to the central party, or over £1,500 relating to an accounting unit. This includes aggregates of donations and loans from the same source during the calendar year.
- 3. As the parties only report donations and loans over these thresholds, the figures do not include all donations and loans to political parties. Donations and loans under these thresholds are recorded in political parties' annual Statements of Accounts. To view these accounts, visit our register here.

- 4. Public funds are donations from the House of Commons, the House of Lords, the Scottish Parliament and the Electoral Commission. 'Short' and 'Cranborne' grants are available to parties in opposition in the House of Commons or House of Lords respectively.
- 5. Some donations appear on the register as being from the Electoral Commission. These are Policy Development Grants, which were established by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 for parties represented in the Commons by two or more sitting members. The grants are intended to assist parties in developing the policies that they will present in an election manifesto. The legislation provides the total sum of £2 million annually for this purpose. Policy Development Grants became reportable as donations for the first time in quarter three of 2006 as a result of the Electoral Administration Act 2006.
- 6. There were 364 registered political parties in Great Britain during this quarter, 59 of which were required to submit their quarterly donation returns and 52 to submit borrowing information within the deadline. The remaining political parties were exempt (unless they received donations) because they have previously submitted four consecutive nil returns.

Changes to the transparency of donations and loans to political parties and regulated donees in Northern Ireland

The Transparency of Donations and Loans etc. (Northern Ireland Political Parties) Order 2018 was laid before the UK Parliament on 23 November 2017.

Under the Political Parties Elections and Referendums Act 2000 (PPERA), it is currently unlawful for the Electoral Commission to disclose any information reported to us about donations and loans made to Northern Ireland parties and regulated donees.

Once the new legislation is passed, details of reportable donations received and loans entered into by parties and regulated donees (members of political parties, members associations, and holders of elective office such as MPs, MEPs, MLAs and councillors) from 1 July 2017 will be published on our website. We expect to start publishing details of donations and loans to parties and regulated donees when the law comes into force.

To help you understand the changes to the rules, we have published a factsheet providing more information which you can find <u>here</u>.

The requirements on what political parties and regulated donees must report to the Electoral Commission will remain the same in most cases. The changes are primarily to what the Commission is required to publish.

Changes that affect your reporting obligations

The new rules will apply from 1 July 2017. In practice this means that information about some donations or loans relating to the period between 1 January and 30 June 2017 may also be published because of the aggregation rules.

It is therefore important that parties and regulated donees provided the "received dates" for all relevant donations and the "entered into" dates for all loans or changes to loans (including the date the changes took effect) reported in the Quarter 3 (July to September) return. The same applies for the Quarter 4 (October – December) return due to be reported in January 2018.

These dates will be used to determine whether information can be published, meaning that without them the Commission may not be able to publish them. We may write to parties and regulated donees at a later date to confirm the accuracy of these dates included in the Quarter 3 and Quarter 4 returns. If appropriate and proportionate at the time, we may also exercise our powers under Schedule 19B paragraph 1 of PPERA to compel the provision of these dates.

Changes that allow the Electoral Commission to begin to publish information about Northern Ireland donations and loans

We would encourage you to familiarise yourself with how the changes will allow the Electoral Commission to publish information about donations and loans, so that you can inform your donors and party members. The appendix to the factsheet provides some useful working examples of how the rules will work in practice. It also includes a table showing what will or will not be published if a donor has made a series of donations during 2017 that are covered by the rules on "aggregation" above the reporting thresholds.

Next steps

You should ensure that you have submitted the "received" and "entered into" dates for any donations and loans that were reported in Quarter 3 return and due to be reported in the Quarter 4 return. Please use our paper forms to report your donations and loans available on our <u>website</u>. We are currently working towards updating PFR Online to allow online reporting and will provide more details on how to do this in 2018.

It would be helpful if you could contact your party members so they are aware of the rules as regulated donees and ask them to contact us should they have any questions.



Parties and regulated donees may wish to inform anyone who has donated and/or lends money over the relevant thresholds from 1 July 2017 about these changes. It means that the names of donors and lenders of amounts over the relevant thresholds will be published in the online register on the Electoral Commission's website, in the same way as in Great Britain.

We will publish amended guidance once the law has changed. You should check our website regularly for further updates. In the meantime, if you have any questions then please contact us at infonorthernireland@electoralcommission.org.uk.

Vote Leave investigation

Caroline Cadwalladr of the **Guardian** and **Observer** reported on the Vote Leave investigation in two articles over the weekend.

In the <u>Guardian</u>, Cadwalladr reports on the "mystery letter" which Dominic Cummings "had told people that the Electoral Commission had given Vote Leave permission to donate to other campaigns – and it had it in writing." The article details the FOI requests Cadwalladr made to the Commission in relation to correspondents with Vote Leave, and the conclusion that the Commission "can't find any record of any exchange with us on the subject of donations between them from that period". It goes on to detail Cummings's background and the role of social media stating "Cummings writes that 98% of its budget went online on ads that received nearly a billion impressions. This was where the battle for Brexit was won: on the internet." Finally, it concludes asking questions about their "dark ads", their expense returns and "what does May know?"

In the **Observer** [print only, page 1 and 8] Cadwalladr reported Vote Leave faces fresh questions over payments it made during the EU referendum. The article states "the Electoral Commission has denied a claim by Vote Leave's chief strategist, Dominic Cummings, that it had given them 'a letter of permission' to make the donations". Stephen Kinnock MP is also report in the article as saying "the Electoral Commission really needs to lay it's facts on the table. Is Dominic Cummings correct? Was there a letter? Was some sort of deal made? The British public really does deserve to be told." Commission guidance is also reference in the article.

BBC News and **Talk Radio** also reported on Cadwalladr's front page story.

The on duty press officer spoke with Henry Mance, political correspondent for the **Financial Times**, over the weekend, answering questions regarding Vote Leve funding. In an article published last night, and appearing on page 3 of the paper today, Mance wrote that highly-partisan campaigns and targeted social media advertising have created a different challenge for the Commission. The UK's rules on elections and referendums were designed for billboards and leaflets, not social media: printed ads have to disclose who paid for them, but online equivalents do not.

Before the referendum, Steve Baker, a Conservative MP who was a leading member of Vote Leave and is now a Brexit Minister, said the rules meant that "Vote Leave will be able to spend as much money as is necessary to win the referendum". Vote Leave says it did not act in concert with Mr Grimes and Veterans for Britain. Mance writes of "several points [that] suggest at least that their thinking was aligned" including Mr Grimes backing Vote Leave's application to be designated as the official campaign for Brexit. He spent Vote Leave's £625,000 donation with Canada-based AggregateIQ, Vote Leave's preferred digital ad provider (the money was paid directly from Vote Leave to AggregateIQ). Published documents show Mr Grimes was able to commission

advertising from AggregateIQ before Vote Leave had confirmed in writing how much it would donate to him on two occasions, and on a third within 22 minutes of it doing so.

Russian interference

Nick Robinson wrote in the **Mail on Sunday** [print only, page 27] about alleged Russian interference and calls on "all-powerful and all too often unaccountable social media companies" to address this. Robinson states that "Russia is deploying information in the way it once deployed tanks and missiles. Its aim is to weaker its traditional enemies and old alliances – Nato, the US, the EU and yes, the UK." The article notes how Russian interference isn't just about political or global power by "can affect the way we live our lives day to day" with fake news. It continues to detail how Russia is apparently using Facebook and Twitter, Russia Today and notes the Commission inquiry into Vote Leave.

The **Express** also reported over the weekend that Donald Tusk "twists May's words to suggest Russian interfered in Brexit referendum." Mr Tusk is reported saying at a press conference that "one of the biggest problems today is the real threat when it comes to cyber attacks fake news hybrid war etc", continuing "today we witness in the free world on both sides of the Atlantic some consequences of interventions," and referred to May's speech at Mansion House. The articles quotes Bob Posner speaking to the Times, saying "we are asking questions of Facebook and Twitter and this work is ongoing. We don't just sit back and see what lands on our doorstep."

Scotland

The **Sunday Herald** [print only, page 13] reported yesterday that the "Scottish Tories have been accused of 'shameless' hypocrisy over their support for the environment", following a donation from a climate change sceptic. The articles reports the donation is of £2,000 from Global Warming Policy Foundations to John Lamont MP. It comes as Ruth Davidson, whom Lamont helped elect as party leader by running her campaign, will speak at the Green Energy Awards this week.

Gemma Thomas

Several papers in East Anglia, including the <u>lpswich Star</u> has reported the sad passing of Gemma Thomas, wife of TV presenter Simon Thomas and a former press officer at the Electoral Commission. The Sky Sports presenter and former Blue Peter presenter said he was "crushed with indescribable pain" after Gemma died just three days after falling ill with acute myeloid leukaemia.

Northern Ireland transparency

Open Democracy has stated that "precise details behind a controversial £435,000 donation to Northern Ireland's Democratic Unionist Party will continue to be protected in law," following the order being laid last week. The article notes that "the new law will only cover funding received on or after July 2017." It notes so called "dark money" saying a "donation to the DUP in 2016 was made by a Glasgow-based organisation called the Constitutional Research Council (CRC). The money, a record donation and far larger than any previous DUP campaign, was used throughout the UK as part of the Brexit campaign."

For interest

Reuters reports on the Nepalese elections which took place yesterday, which will "choose a new parliament and seven state assemblies more than a decade after the end of a civil war." It notes that these elections are two-phase, and "the first in Nepal since it turned into a federal republic and abolished monarchy in 2008." The article has a timeline from 2008 detailing it's road to democracy.

Changes to the transparency of donations and loans to political parties and regulated donees in Northern Ireland

Following the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland's announcement on 3 July, the Commission anticipates the Transparency of Donations and Loans etc. (Northern Ireland Political Parties) Order 2017 being laid before the UK Parliament in September.

If it gets Parliamentary approval, it will change the rules on confidentiality of donations and loans to Northern Ireland political parties and regulated donees (members of political parties, members associations, and holders of elective office such as MPs, MEPs, MLAs and councillors).

The changes will allow the Electoral Commission to publish details of donations received and loans entered into by Northern Ireland parties and regulated donees. The new transparency rules are proposed to apply from 1 July 2017.

The requirements on what political parties and regulated donees must report to the Electoral Commission will remain essentially the same. The changes are primarily to what the Commission is required to publish. Going forward, the Commission will

publish information about donations and loans in Northern Ireland in essentially the same way as we do for donations and loans in Great Britain.

We expect to publish the first set of data in November or December. This will be the returns from political parties for Quarter 3 (July to September) of 2017, and any reports made by regulated donees about donations or loans from that same time period.

Transparency of political finance in Northern Ireland

The Electoral Commission has today expressed its disappointment that it remains unable to publish the details of political donations and loans in Northern Ireland, because the UK Government has not yet made the necessary legislation.

In July the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced that he would bring forward legislation to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of data on donations to Northern Ireland political parties today, alongside the information on donations to political parties in Great Britain. However, it is unable to do so as the necessary legislation has not been made. Because of this the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing any information relating to donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland.

In response to this, Ann Watt, Head of the Electoral Commission in Northern Ireland said:

"We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to provide the public with the information they expected on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded. The continuing secrecy only serves to undermine trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

We were consulted by the Northern Ireland Office several months ago on draft legislation and provided detailed comments. In our view the legislation is ready to be laid in Parliament now.

The Commission urges the UK Government to immediately bring forward this legislation to allow us to publish this information as soon as possible."

Hi All,

I'm unable to access the link to action points list for this afternoon's meeting and I want to raise an issue.

We will be writing to parties asking them to give us a breakdown of the individual donations that make up payments under the NI A – Financial assistance to Political Parties Scheme(FAPPS). The letter will also point out that going forward they will need to provide a breakdown of individual payments included in any aggregated amount they are reporting.

FAPPS is paid to parties in two main ways – Salaries– paid 3rd last working day of the month (I would expect each of these payments to be over £500) and ad hoc payments – for example to cover mobile phone bills, pay for constituency newsletters – each of these amounts is most likely well below £500.

It is a matter for the party to have an arrangement between their nominating officer and the person appointed as a deputy for signing the nomination forms. The Electoral Commission does not require that the nominating officer authorises in writing the appointment of someone on their behalf; the party should satisfy itself that it has an arrangement in place for a nomination form to be authorised.

4 Commission reports on UK Parliamentary General Election

The Commission is taking a new approach to reports for the UK Parliamentary General Election. Instead of one long report, we are publishing shorter thematic reports on different issues. Note these reports cover the UK as a whole, but will include Northern Ireland issues where appropriate:

<u>Electoral registration at UKPGE</u> (published on 17 July): this report recommended a number of steps to ensure the register is kept as up to date as possible, including more automatic registration and better data-sharing with other public services. It also repeated our call for online registration to be introduced in Northern Ireland.

<u>Voter experience of polls</u> (10 October): this report will repeat our recommendation that online registration should be introduced in Northern Ireland.

Administration of the poll (30 October): this report will include comment on the allegations of electoral fraud made at the time of the election. (Note this issue is on the agenda later – see Chief Electoral Officer item).

Candidate experience of polls (6 November)

Voters with disabilities experience of polls (14 November)

Commentary on party finance and regulation issues (16 November)

<u>Campaign spending returns</u> (date TBC)

Allegations of electoral fraud (date TBC)

5 First publication of donation and loans returns

On 3 July, the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced that in future information about donations and loans to NI parties would be made public. This will apply to donations and loans accepted from 1 July 2017 onwards. In practice this means that the donations and loan information received for 2017Q3 (July to September) will be published.

The Electoral Commission welcomed this announcement as we have long campaigned for transparency in order to increase confidence in the political system. We also said that we would like to see transparency back-dated to January 2014, as was envisaged in the primary legislation passed at that time.

We have been working with the Government on the secondary legislation needed to enable transparency. We expect the legislation to be laid in Parliament early in October. Once passed, the Electoral Commission will be able to publish the donation and loan information provided to us by political parties and regulated donees.

We expect the first publication of donations and loans data (for 2017Q3) to be later this year. Timing will depend on when the legislation is passed.

Parties should submit their donation and loan returns to the Electoral Commission as previously. The only main difference from the previous regime is that this information will now be published. The deadline for submission of returns for 2017Q3 is 30 October.

We are aware that parties may have questions about how transparency will work in practice. Once the enabling legislation is laid in Parliament, we will publish guidance on the new framework, which we will send to all parties, MPs and MLAs. We are also available to answer any questions parties or regulated donees may have.

6 Electoral Commission modernisation projects

The Electoral Commission is doing two UK-wide projects to improve the service we provide to stakeholders. The first project aims to make our guidance quicker and easier to use, and will modernise all the guidance we provide for parties, candidates, campaigners and electoral administrators. The other project is the re-development of PEF Online, the online system parties and campaigners use to submit statutory returns to us.

As users of the Commission's guidance and of PEF Online, we would welcome the view of the parties on both these projects. Attendees have been sent a paper on each project in advance of the meeting.

The Project Manager will introduce each project. Afterwards please encourage the parties to give us their views.



1 Welcome and introductions

- 1.1 The Chair, Anna Carragher, welcomed everyone to the meeting and introduced to the Panel.
- 2 Notes of previous meeting on 19 June 2017
- 2.1 The Panel agreed the notes of the previous meeting.

Matters arising

2.2 Previously, parties had complained that the seven day deadline for co-opting new members to the Northern Ireland Assembly was too short. The Chief Electoral Officer for Northern Ireland (CEO) had discussed this with the Northern Ireland Office (NIO) and this issue had been added to the NIO list for consideration for possible future legislation. 2.3 At the June Panel meeting, a party had asked whether they could appoint a deputy nominating officer, since at the UK Parliamentary General Election their nominating officer was out of the country and this had created problems with signing nomination papers.

The Commission's advice was that a party can appoint a deputy nominating officer to sign nomination forms. The party was not required to notify the Commission of this, but should have a clear arrangement in place within its own party structures.

- 3 Issues raised by the political parties
- 3.1 No items had been raised by the parties in advance of the meeting.

4 Elect oral Commission reports on UK Parliamentary General Election

- 4.1 The Chair made the Panel aware of a recent Electoral Commission Board discussion on the impact of digital media on elections. The Board is very aware of digital media's potential impact and is considering its own approach to regulation.
- 4.2 The Commission had taken a new approach to reports for the UK Parliamentary Election. Instead of publishing one long report, it would be publishing a series of shorter reports on different issues, including Northern Ireland issues as appropriate.
- 4.3 The Panel was advised of the following publication schedule:
 - <u>Electoral registration at UKPGE</u> (published on 17 July): this report repeated the Commission's call for online registration to be introduced in Northern Ireland.
 - Voter experience of polls (10 October)
 - <u>Administration of the poll</u> (30 October): this report would focus on electoral administration issues.
 - Candidate experience of polls (6 November)
 - Vot ers with disabilities' experience of polls (14 November)
 - Commentary on party finance and regulation issues, along with details of candidate and party campaign spending (less than £250k)(16 November)
 - Party campaign spending returns (more than £250k) (early 2018)
 - Allegations of electoral fraud (early 2018)

5 First publication of donation and loans returns

- 5.1 The Electoral Commission had welcomed the announcement by the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland on 3 July 2017 that, in future, information about donations and loans to Northern Ireland parties would be made public. This would apply to donations and loans accepted from 1 July 2017 onwards, and in practice would mean that the donation and loan information received for 2017 Quarter 3 (July to September) would be published.
- 5.2 The Commission had long pressed for transparency in order to increase confidence in the political system and would continue to lobby for transparency to be back-dated to January 2014, as was envisaged in the primary legislation passed at that time.
- 5.3 Since the announcement, the Commission has been commenting on the draft secondary legislation needed to enable transparency. The legislation was expected to be laid in Parliament early in October, subject to the parliamentary timetable. Once passed, the Electoral Commission would be able to publish the donation and loan information provided by political parties and regulated donees from 1 July 2017. It hoped to publish the first donations and loans data (for 2017 Q3) later in 2017, as long as there were no legislative delays.
- 5.4 Parties should submit their donation and loan returns to the Electoral Commission as previously, and should contact the Commission if they had any questions on the practicalities of how transparency will work. The deadline for submission of returns for 2017 Quarter 3 is 30 October.
- 5.5 Once the enabling legislation was laid in Parliament, the Commission intended to publish guidance on the new framework, for circulation to all parties, MPs and MLAs.

6 Electoral Commission modernisation projects

The Chair informed the Panel of two UK-wide Commission projects to improve the service provided to stakeholders. The Commission would be consulting widely on both and asked for the parties' participation in this. A paper on each project had been circulated in advance of the meeting.

Delivering modern guidance

6.2 The Delivering Modern Guidance project had been set up to recommend a way forward which retained the quality and scope of the Commission's guidance but modernised its ease of use for the digital age.

Panel through an analysis of the existing system, user testing, good practice elsewhere, and a review of technological options. The conclusion so far was that it was not practical to maintain the current approach to guidance which was based on pdf documents, and the Commission should look at moving to a webbased approach.

- 6.3 Some guidance would be developed in a web-based format by the end of 2017 for internal review, followed by wider consultation and user testing over the winter. If the new format was judged to be successful, a tailored phased introduction was planned from April 2018.
- highlighted how useful the involvement of the Northern Ireland parties would be in ensuring the new system best met local needs. She asked the parties to consider taking part in the testing and design of the new system. This would involve a couple of phone calls pre-Christmas, a 2-3 hr meeting in January/March 2018 and a couple of subsequent phone conversations.
- 6.4 The party representatives echoed the user consultation findings so far that they had difficulty locating relevant information in the large volume of pdf-format guidance currently available.

Re-development of PEF Online

- also asked for the parties' participation in the project to replace the existing PEF Online system. A User Group would be a key part of the 'agile' delivery of this new system, with users' views built in to the initial and ongoing development of a new system. Involvement would mean an initial one hour talk to a Business Analyst in Belfast, with heavier involvement (over 6-8 months) from Easter at the start of the build. This might involve workshops in Belfast and a fortnightly hour-long feedback session. It is planned the new system would be phased in during 2019.
- 6.6 Only one major party in Northern Ireland consistently used PEF Online, with Panel members reporting they had found it complicated to use, including making changes to office holders etc. They would welcome a system that was easier to use.
- 6.7 Following a wider discussion on which party members may be most relevant to feed in views, the parties were asked to contact Ann Watt if they were interested in participating in either of the above projects. The Chair encouraged the parties to participate in the user consultation, in order to ensure the views of the Northern Ireland parties were reflected.

7 Chief Electoral Officer for Northern Ireland - update

Online registration

- 7.1 The CEO reported that online registration, mirroring that in the rest of the UK, was undergoing final testing and was due to be introduced in November. Online applications would probably take 1.5 3 minutes in time and should be straightforward. The existing paper-based form registration process would remain for those who preferred to use it.
- 7.2 As discussed at previous meetings, the introduction of this system had been delayed because of recent elections. EONI staff's feedback on the system had been positive, and of course Northern Ireland had benefitted from learning experiences from the rollout of the online registration system in Great Britain first.
- 7.3 The CEO would be contacting parties to arrange meetings to discuss a communication strategy and will arrange an opportunity to view the system. Research shows that registration advertising campaigns outside of election periods do not provide value for money so there will be a 'soft launch' with only a small amount of PR. A key part of the public message would be aimed at avoiding duplicate registrations, so existing electors did not attempt to re-register unless their details had changed.
- 7.4 As part of a wider discussion on registering attainers, the CEO highlighted the challenges of the current situation, trying to balance remaining on standby for a possible election with other work such as offering young people the opportunity to register through EONI's programme of visiting schools. The CEONI said that they were considering how to phase in a new format of the schools programme once online registration was in place.
- 7.5 A party representative asked about whether EONI's schools programme reached a balanced set of schools across Northern Ireland. The CEONI confirmed that it did.

Absent votes

- 7.6 The CEO had reviewed the administration of the absent votes regime following the allegations of fraud widely covered in the media around the time of the UK Parliamentary General Election. Seven cases had been reported to the PSNI.
- 7.7 As part of this review, the largest group of people who repeatedly applied for an absent vote had been identified as people working away from home (around 3,600 electors). The CEO suggested one possible step would be to check whether the individuals within this group still met the criteria for being on the electoral register at this address.

8 Political Finance – statutory return deadlines

8.1 Parties were reminded that donation and loan reports for Quarter 3, 1 July – 30 September 2017 must be submitted to the Commission by 30 October 2016.

9 Any Other Business

- 9.1 A party representative asked for clarification on the process to register party emblems, particularly about whether another party could register an emblem similar to one of an existing party. It was confirmed that for new applications, any proposed emblem was compared to existing emblems on the Commission's register. If these were similar, the new application would be rejected to avoid voter confusion on ballot papers.
- 9.2 A party queried if it would be appropriate for the Electoral Commission or Information Commissioner's Office to provide training or guidance to parties regarding the new 2018 Data Protection legislation. The Electoral Commission was currently reviewing the impact of this legislation and would update the Panel.

Following on from our conversations earlier today about recording receipt of donation and loan returns received into the NI office in order to avoid duplication/confusion I thought I would set out my understanding of what will happen. Please come back to me if this isn't correct or you think it makes more sense to do things a different way.

The NI office will:

- Log receipt of any physical /email returns submitted to the NI office in the NI post log and document record sheet in the Q3 2017 physical folder in the NI safe.
- Scan and upload the returns as soon as possible to the relevant party's sub folder in the 'NI Transparency' Folder on the N Drive.
- Complete the 'data' sheet on the "Current donations and loans spreadsheet 2008 onwards" (ie date received and logged and colour coded to indicate if it reported a donation /loan or if it is a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th nil return.) We will leave London colleagues to complete the 'Notes' sheet which appears to be a new addition on the spreadsheet.
- We will record the details of actual donations reported on the political party data spreadsheet, as we have previously been doing and will carry out permissibility checks on any reports received into the NI office - We can agree how you would like completion of the checks communicated to you/recorded.

We <u>will not</u> enter data on any of the newly formed spreadsheets in the Q3 sub-folder in the NI transparency folder. i.e. exemptions spreadsheet and a publications spreadsheet

In terms of the detail of any changes to existing loans – we can continue to log this on the existing loans sheet if you are happy with that? If there are new loans we can agree where is best to record these on the N drive – as well as PEF online if that is proposed.

As mentioned I'm happy to do things another way, but we are now receiving Q3 2017 returns and I would like to avoid any confusion about who records what and where.

Bob, Louise Edwards and Louise Footner have agreed the approach below. I would be grateful if you could pass this on to Claire for her approval.

The most relevant line in the current Executive Scheme of Delegation is below:

Publication of the donation and loan returns for Northern Ireland donations is more complex than other statutory returns, since the Commission has to be sure <u>not</u> to publish any information that under PPERA 71E should remain confidential (ie information relating to donations or loans before 1 July 2017). Given this complexity, we suggest that we create an <u>additional</u> line in the Scheme of Delegation (see red text below). Given that the Regulation team is handling the Northern Ireland donation and loan returns and preparing the data for publication, we think it is more appropriate that Louise E signs off the publication, but that Ann is consulted.

Britain First

Donald Trump yesterday retweeted a series of islamophobic videos posted by the deputy leader of Britain First, Jayda Fransen. The twitter activity sparked major media interest, and Theresa May is reported on the front page of the <u>Guardian</u> to have condemned Trump's actions. However the paper reports that "Downing Street rejected calls from Labour MPs to revoke the US president's invitation to pay a state visit to Britain."

The press office received a number of calls from journalists about Britain First because they "Statutorily Deregistered" on our website. We worked with the party registration team to inform journalists that; "in order to remain registered, each year a party must deliver a confirmation that their registered details are correct, along with a fee of £25. The confirmation must be delivered to the Commission within 6 months of the deadline for the submission of the party's statement of accounts. Britain First was due to deliver their confirmation by 31 October 2017. The party did not deliver the confirmation by the deadline and accordingly the Commission removed the party from the register as required by law." This was also reported in the **Guardian** [page 4], **Daily Mail** [page 11], i [page 4] **CNN**, and **Wall Street Journal** [paywall].

James Landale, Diplomatic Correspondent for BBC News, also tweeted Trump with the information we provided:





@realDonaldTrump Just for the record, Britain First is no longer officially a political party. It was de-registered by @ElectoralCommUK on Nov 2 this year after failing to pay its £25 sub.

The retweets continues to receive news coverage with politicians including <u>Jeremy Corby</u> condemning Trumps' actions, <u>analysis pieces</u> on Britain First, and <u>comment pieces</u>.

Vote Leave investigation

<u>Times Higher Education</u> supplement reported today in its weekly roundup that the Commission has launched an investigation into Vote Leave. It notes the investigation looks into whether Vote Leave "gave £625,000 to a University of Brighton fashion student", and reference the Daily Mail from 20th November; "Vote Leave handed cash to activist Darren Grimes and Veterans for Britain

as it neared its £7million spending limit ahead of the EU referendum." The piece concludes saying "Mr Grimes' campaign, BeLeave, managed to attract only 6,300 Facebook likes and just 3,700 Twitter followers, it has previously been reported. And the thanks that Vote Leave receives for supporting this fine example of student entrepreneurship is a grilling from the Electoral Commission."

Russian Interference

Yesterday a <u>cross-party of MEPs</u> raised concerns with the European Commission about alleged Russian interference in the EU referendum. Green, Labour, Lib Dem and Plaid Cymru MEPs together with an ex-Conservative MEP have signed a <u>letter</u> to the Commission about their concerns. They have asked how much the Commission know of Russian influence in the referendum campaign and of the techniques used; whether they consider such interference was an attempt by the Kremlin to attack and destabilise the EU; and whether they will use EU agencies to investigate the allegations.

Liam Byrne of **The New European** [print only, page 8-9] also reports today on "who's hacking Brexit?" The article looks at alleged Russian interference and says their "campaign dates back many years. The beginning of Russian involvement entailed lots of encouragement for Nigel Farage." Byrne goes on to talk about General Valery Gerasimov "the Russian army's Chief of Staff", and his apparent "revised thinking based on the insight that the riles of war have changed" and that it "now centres on wholesale interference in Western democracy". The article details the five steps Russia has apparently taken to achieve this on social media, and references our investigation into funding of the referendum and states the commission cannot "investigate foreign individuals donating and cannot insist on the same sort of imprints for digital ads that are required on printed literature" – something we have reputedly recommended. It finishes up reporting on Legatum and Christopher Chandler connections to Russian, and calls on Britain to "get to the bottom of weather our democracy has been hacked."

Northern Ireland

Derry News [print only, page 4] reports that "the British Government's refusal to backdate new laws on political donations is aimed at covering up so-called Brexit 'dark money' that was paid to the DUP, Sinn Fein MP Elisha McCallion has said." McCallion is reported referencing our statement to the Government before the order was laid last Thursday, and says "there will be no transparency around the vast sums that were paid to the DUP during the Brexit referendum." The MP is calling for the reporting to be backdated to January 2014.

Labour's elections candidates

Owen Jones in the <u>Guardian</u> today reacts to yesterday's Times article on "Moderates forced out by hard left in Labour purge." Jones puts the other side of the story saying "members have democratically decided that some sitting councillors should face an open contest. This happened automatically until a rule change last year. Calculating that they will lose to a leftwing alternative, some have stood down." He goes on to say "this is what is known as "democracy", and references what is happening in Haringey. Jones concludes saying "The truth is this: the rightwing press, the Tories and the vested interests who fund and support them are terrified of Momentum", and "democratisation of the Labour party is a good thing – and necessary if a democratic socialist society really will be built."

Meanwhile Peter Jones writes on <u>Labour List</u> that "Labour has quietly dropped plans to select candidates for 75 target seats before Christmas." This apparently comes as Corbyn wanted "to get candidates in place following a summer of campaigning. He had said the party would remain in "permanent campaign mode" amid speculation Theresa May's government could fall after the prime minister squandered the Tories' majority in the June election."

For interest

It's reported on the <u>Electoral Reform Society's</u> blog that they have a new Council to govern the Society for the next two years. It states that "39 candidates standing for the 15 seats available" and "members had four weeks to vote using the Single Transferable Vote system of proportional representation." 

We will be writing to parties asking them to give us a breakdown of the individual donations that make up payments under the NI A – Financial assistance to Political Parties Scheme(FAPPS). The letter will also point out that going forward they will need to provide a breakdown of individual payments included in any aggregated amount they are reporting.

FAPPS is paid to parties in two main ways – Salaries– paid 3rd last working day of the month (I would expect each of these payments to be over £500) and ad hoc payments – for example to cover mobile phone bills, pay for constituency newsletters – each of these amounts is most likely well below £500.

Also, please be aware that there can be **no disclosure of NI donations and loans etc until such time as the legislation is actually in force**. The legislation is an Order made by a statutory instrument which is subject to an affirmative Parliamentary procedure. This means that before it can come into force, the Order has to be laid, debated by and then if passed, made (i.e. signed by the appropriate Minister. The Electoral Commission has today expressed its disappointment that it remains unable to publish the details of political donations and loans in Northern Ireland, because the UK Government has not yet made the necessary legislation.

In July the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced that he would bring forward legislation to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of data on donations to Northern Ireland political parties today, alongside the information on donations to political parties in Great Britain. However, it is unable to do so as the necessary legislation has not been made. Because of this the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing any information relating to donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland.

In response to this, Ann Watt, Head of the Electoral Commission in Northern Ireland said:

"We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to provide the public with the information they expected on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded. The continuing secrecy only serves to undermine trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

We were consulted by the Northern Ireland Office several months ago on draft legislation and provided detailed comments. In our view the legislation is ready to be laid in Parliament now.

The Commission urges the UK Government to immediately bring forward this legislation to allow us to publish this information as soon as possible."

We will be writing to parties asking them to give us a breakdown of the individual donations that make up payments under the NI A – Financial assistance to Political Parties Scheme(FAPPS). The letter will also point out that going forward they will need to provide a breakdown of individual payments included in any aggregated amount they are reporting.

Welcome back from leave. Just a quick update on the Order from me. We have a meeting planned in with on Friday morning at your office and via video for me. I haven't had any updates from apart from setting up the meeting and one technical drafting point on coming into force dates, which Jenny and I think would be better left until we know NIO's thinking about laying the Order.

As the Sept/Oct window for laying the Order has gone by, it won't be possible to publish the GB and NI data for Q3 at the same time. We also don't know if NIO has a new plan for laying the Order. Hopefully will update us on his thinking on Friday but I wouldn't be surprised if the plans are still quite high-level pending further progress in the NI party talks.

So, I wondered if we should float the idea internally within the Commission, and then informally with NIO, of publishing all the NI data for Q3 and Q4 for the first time together, and at the same time as the GB Q4 data – that would probably be around 20 February.

I am not absolutely sure without checking latest communications has had that the legislation is absolutely ready to lay – and in any event something could happen that might affect the drafting, so I agree with Claire that our statement should be tempered accordingly. Also, please be aware that there can be **no disclosure of NI donations and loans etc until such time as the legislation is actually in force**. The legislation is an Order made by a statutory instrument which is subject to an affirmative Parliamentary procedure. This means that before it can come into force, the Order has to be laid, debated by and then if passed, made (i.e. signed by the appropriate Minister. The latest draft of the Order I have seen (24 October draft) provides for most of the Order to come into force on the day after the day on which it is made, with the articles which make provision relating to regulated donees coming into force on the 21st day after the day on which the Order is made. I will suggest tweaks to the proposed statement to reflect this.

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, our contact at the NIO, has talked me through what happens next with the Order and here is a flowchart showing my understanding of the stages. Some key points:

- It is an affirmative Order so it has to go through three stages of consideration/debate before it can be 'made'. The Order can't be amended, but it has to be approved at each stage.
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In our press statement today, we have said we hope to be able to publish early in the New Year. Just to help with internal expectations and planning – it is possible that the Order will be in force by mid-January, or it is possible that it won't happen until later in January or even in February or later. As a minimum, we will want it to be in force by late February so that we can publish Q4 reports for GB and NI at the same time.

Hopefully Ann and I can get an update from NIO or Parliamentary authorities next week about the scheduling of debates. When we know more, we could discuss at a future external issues meeting whether and when the Commission could look at issuing briefings/letters in support of the Order.

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

Just to confirm that the Transparency of Donations and Loans etc Order was laid before Parliament yesterday afternoon. Under PPERA, it is currently unlawful for the Electoral Commission to disclose any information reported to us about donations and loans made to Northern Ireland parties and regulated donees. Once the new legislation is passed, details of reportable donations received and loans entered into by parties and regulated donees (members of political parties, members associations, and holders of elective office such as MPs, MEPs, MLAs and councillors) from 1 July 2017 will be published on our website.

Now the Order has been laid, guidance has:

- 1. Published a new factsheet explaining the changes to the rules with working examples;
- 2. Updated our website to reflect the changes; and
- 3. Issued a letter to all NI party treasurers and NI MPs/MLAs explaining the changes to the rules and where they can find more information (this is part of a series of letters sent to parties/MPs to help them understand the rules).

This work has been on-going for some months and we are pleased to have been able to publish our guidance to provide clarity on the new rules. Further guidance will be published as soon as the law come into force.

There's still internal implementation work to consider before the law come into force but this is a big step forward.

Following on from our conversations earlier today about recording receipt of donation and loan returns received into the NI office in order to avoid duplication/confusion I thought I would set out my understanding of what will happen. Please come back to me if this isn't correct or you think it makes more sense to do things a different way.

The NI office will:

- Log receipt of any physical /email returns submitted to the NI office in the NI post log and document record sheet in the Q3 2017 physical folder in the NI safe.
- Scan and upload the returns as soon as possible to the relevant party's sub folder in the 'NI Transparency' Folder on the N Drive.

- Complete the 'data' sheet on the "Current donations and loans spreadsheet 2008 onwards" (ie date received and logged and colour coded to indicate if it reported a donation /loan or if it is a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th nil return.) We will leave London colleagues to complete the 'Notes' sheet which appears to be a new addition on the spreadsheet.
- We will record the details of actual donations reported on the political party data spreadsheet, as we have previously been doing and will carry out permissibility checks on any reports received into the NI office - We can agree how you would like completion of the checks communicated to you/recorded.

We <u>will not</u> enter data on any of the newly formed spreadsheets in the Q3 sub-folder in the NI transparency folder. i.e. exemptions spreadsheet and a publications spreadsheet

In terms of the detail of any changes to existing loans – we can continue to log this on the existing loans sheet if you are happy with that? If there are new loans we can agree where is best to record these on the N drive – as well as PEF online if that is proposed.

As mentioned I'm happy to do things another way, but we are now receiving Q3 2017 returns and I would like to avoid any confusion about who records what and where.

Latest figures for GB political party donations and loans borrowing published

Seven political parties registered in Great Britain reported accepting a total of more than £6 million in donations between 1 July and 30 September 2017 – the first quarterly reporting period after the UK Parliamentary general election - according to new figures published today.

This quarter saw around the same amount in reported donations when compared to the same quarter in 2016 (£6.5million). There was a steep decline compared to the previous quarter of 2017, which covered the UK Parliamentary general election and saw more than £40 million in donations reported.

The seven political parties to report donations accepted were:

In addition to these donations, during the third quarter of 2017 five parties accepted a total of more than £3.3 million from public funds – money and assistance allocated to parliamentary opposition parties to assist with costs.

The value of outstanding loans to political parties as of 30 September 2017 stood at £4,151,868, which is a decrease of £59,240 compared to the end of the second quarter of 2017.

Ten parties failed to meet the deadline for reporting for this quarter. The Commission will consider each of these matters in line with its enforcement policy, which is available to view here.

Northern Ireland

In July this year the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland announced legislation would be brought forward to enable the publication of donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland from 1 July 2017.

The Electoral Commission had expected to publish the first set of this data as part of today's publication; however, the legislation has not been made and the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing this information.

Bob Posner, Director of Political Finance and Regulation & Legal Counsel at the Electoral Commission said:

"This data is hugely important in ensuring that our political finance system is as transparent as possible across the whole of the UK. We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to provide the public with the information they expected on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded. The continuing secrecy only serves to undermine trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

"The Commission urges the UK Government without delay to bring forward the legislation that it has already announced, for parliament to approve. This would allow us to publish donations and loans to Northern Ireland parties as soon as possible."

Notes to editors

- 1. The Electoral Commission is the independent body which oversees elections and regulates political finance in the UK. We work to promote public confidence in the democratic process and ensure its integrity by:
 - enabling the delivery of free and fair elections and referendums, focussing on the needs of electors and addressing the changing environment to ensure every vote remains secure and accessible
 - regulating political finance taking proactive steps to increase transparency, ensure compliance and pursue breaches
 - using our expertise to make and advocate for changes to our democracy, aiming to improve fairness, transparency and efficiency

The Commission was set up in 2000 and reports to the UK and Scottish Parliaments.

- 2. The Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 (PPERA) requires registered parties to report cash and non-cash donations and borrowing to the Electoral Commission on a quarterly basis. Political parties must report all donations and borrowing over £7,500 relating to the central party, or over £1,500 relating to an accounting unit. This includes aggregates of donations and loans from the same source during the calendar year.
- 3. As the parties only report donations and loans over these thresholds, the figures do not include all donations and loans to political parties. Donations and loans under these thresholds are recorded in political parties' annual Statements of Accounts. To view these accounts, visit our register here.
- 4. Public funds are donations from the House of Commons, the House of Lords, the Scottish Parliament and the Electoral Commission. 'Short' and 'Cranborne' grants are available to parties in opposition in the House of Commons or House of Lords respectively.
- 5. Some donations appear on the register as being from the Electoral Commission. These are Policy Development Grants, which were established by the Political Parties, Elections and Referendums Act 2000 for parties represented in the Commons by two or more sitting members. The grants are intended to assist parties in developing the policies that they will present in an election manifesto. The legislation provides the total sum of £2 million annually for this purpose. Policy Development Grants became reportable as donations for the first time in quarter three of 2006 as a result of the Electoral Administration Act 2006.
- 6. There were 364 registered political parties in Great Britain during this quarter, 59 of which were required to submit their quarterly donation returns and 52 to submit borrowing information within the deadline. The remaining political parties were exempt (unless they received donations) because they have previously submitted four consecutive nil returns.

Dear Secretary of State

On Thursday 23 November the Electoral Commission will be publishing information on donations and loans received between July and September 2017 by political parties in Great Britain. We were also expecting, for the first time, to publish this information for political parties in Northern Ireland, following your announcement in early July that you would be bringing forward legislation to enable such publication.

Over the last few months Commission staff have been working closely with NIO officials on the necessary legislation that would allow the Commission to publish details of donations and loans reported by political parties in Northern Ireland. We have provided feedback on the drafting of this legislation and were satisfied that it was ready to be laid before Parliament. We were previously advised that this would happen by the middle of October. However this did not happen and no progress seems to have been made since then.

Without the necessary legislation being brought into force by the UK Parliament, the Commission continues to be prohibited from publishing any information relating to donations and loans received by political parties in Northern Ireland. Following your announcement in July there was a public expectation that information on how political parties in Northern Ireland are funded would be available by the end of the year. It is now unclear as to when this will actually happen. We are of the view that this further undermines trust and confidence amongst the public in the democratic process.

We will be issuing a media statement on 23 November to explain why we are unable to publish information on donations and loans in Northern Ireland, to express publicly our disappointment, and to make clear that we are in touch with you about this.
