## 2020 canvass

### Template press releases

To support Electoral Registration Officers (EROs) with the delivery of the 2020 canvass, we have added template press releases to the [democratic engagement resources package](#) on our website. The press releases include messaging that will assist EROs looking to explain to residents how the canvass is being conducted this year, and what they need to do as part of this process. The press releases also include information for residents on the recent changes to the franchise.

We will also be making available further materials, including template social media content, in due course and we will confirm in a future Bulletin when they have been published.

In addition, in anticipation of questions from members of the public, and to help EROs manage any queries they may receive locally, we have added text to [our website](#) to explain what the canvass is and that it has not been postponed.

### Guidance

As set out in [Bulletin 261](#), the UK, Scottish and Welsh governments have all indicated that they intend to bring forward legislation to extend the deadline for the publication of revised registers to 1 February 2021. The UK Government's [legislation](#), applicable to parliamentary registers across Great Britain and local government registers in England, has now been laid in the UK Parliament. We understand the Scottish Government's legislation, applicable to local government registers in Scotland, will be laid shortly.

In light of this, we have now updated our additional [guidance note for EROs](#) on managing the specific circumstances of the 2020 canvass to include key considerations to support EROs in deciding when to publish their register.

## CSPL review of electoral regulation

The Committee on Standards in Public Life (CSPL) opened a review of electoral regulation on 8 June 2020. The independent committee has launched a [public consultation](#) inviting views on the way donations and campaign expenditure by candidates, political parties and non-party campaigners in election and referendum campaigns are regulated and enforced.

As set out in the [terms of reference](#) for the review, one of the strands looks at whether the Electoral Commission's regulatory powers should be expanded to include the enforcement of political finance laws for candidates. Electoral administrators may be particularly interested in this aspect given their role relating to candidate spending returns.

We welcome the review and consider it to be a timely opportunity to look at whether and where the regulatory framework needs to change. We have published a [blog](#) where we talk in more depth about the opportunities this review presents.

The consultation closes at 5pm on Friday 31 July 2020. Anyone with an interest may make a submission.

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
