Electoral Commission study of the accuracy and completeness of the December 2022 electoral registers

We have today (Monday 18 September) published the results of our latest accuracy and completeness research which measures the quality of the electoral registers. Thank you to those EROs who provided copies of their electoral registers to be used in the research.

The results of this study on the December 2022 registers finds that, in Great Britain, both accuracy and completeness are largely stable.

However, across the UK, as many as 8 million people are either not correctly registered at their current address or not registered at all. This means that the electoral registration system is reliant on people registering before an election, which increases both the burden on Electoral Registration Officers as well as the risk that people will remain unregistered and unable to vote.

The research found that young people, private renters and those who have recently moved house continue to be less likely to be correctly registered to vote. Ethnic group, social grade and the number of adults in the household were also significant factors, and there were also significant differences between urban and rural areas and between the regions of England which remain even after controlling for demographic factors.

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The annual canvass process was reformed in 2019 by the UK, Scottish and Welsh governments. While there is no evidence of any significant negative impact on the quality of the registers, there has also been no significant improvement.

Our findings show that the current electoral registration system does not work well for voters or those who run elections, and that urgent reforms are needed so that public data can be used to facilitate voter registration, particularly for those less likely to be correctly registered.

Our report sets out recommendations to the UK's governments to enable the introduction of a more automated form of voter registration, built on better use of existing public data, and also includes a range of options for how specific data sources could be used to improve the accuracy and completeness of the electoral registers.
